## Description

The archive of Mechphres (III), son of Horos, consists of twelve Greek ostraca, acquired by the German Papyruskartell in 1905 and now kept in the Institut für Papyrologie, Heidelberg. They are all tax receipts and date between 17 June AD 137 and 31 August 139. They are issued to Mechphres, son of Horos, grandson of Mechphres, with the exception of 135, where the payment has been transferred by Mechphres' son Mechphres. Mekaphá in 144, probably a mistake for Meapphá, is to be identified with the protagonist Mechphres or his son.  $^{1}$ 

The ostraca show several orthographic variants of the name of the archive owner, including Mεχφρῆς and Mεκφρῆς. The former variant is regularly used by the tax collectors Psansnos and Casianus (133, 134, 136, 138 and 139; see also 135 and 137), while the latter variant appears in the receipts written by Horos and Asklas (140, 142, 143 and 144). The variant Mεκφρῖς is attested only once (141).

Other collections may also contain ostraca from the grandfather and from a grandchild of the protagonist Mechphres (see below).<sup>2</sup>

## **TAXES**

The ostraca contain tax payments from Roman Thebes; in a few cases the tax district of Agorai Duo (141-143) on the Theban East bank and of Agorai Borra (140 with BL), which was part of Agorai Duo,<sup>3</sup> are mentioned. Six ostraca refer to the bath-tax (βαλανευτικόν, 134, 135, [138], 140, 141 and 143), a capitation tax. Also other capitation taxes are found in the receipts, often paid together with the bath-tax (payments of taxes together with the bath-tax are

marked by\*): the dike-tax (χωματικόν, 134\*, 141\* and 143\*); the poll tax or laographia (λαογραφία, 138\* and 140\*); the watchtower-tax (ὑπὲρ σκοπέλων, 133, 134\* and 139), the guard-tax (ὑπὲρ φυλάκων, 133 and 134\*), the tax for the billeting of soldiers (ὑπὲρ διπλῶν, 134\* and 142) and some undefined money taxes (136, 137, 139 and 144).

The taxes were paid either to the money-tax farmers (praktores argyrikon, among them Psansnos & Casianus: 133, 134, 136, 138 and 139, and Horos and/or Asklas: 140, 142, 143 and 144)<sup>4</sup>, to the tax collectors (apaitetai) Paniskos and partners (137), or to the tax farmers of the temple granary (ἐπιτηρηταὶ τέλους θησαυροῦ ἱέρων, 135) for the maintenance of the temple baths.

## OTHER OSTRACA POSSIBLY BELONGING TO THE ARCHIVE (see App. 2)

The name Mechphres in combination with Horos is also found in a number of ostraca of earlier or later date, dealing with similar taxes for the same Theban district,<sup>5</sup> and kept in other collections. These are published in O. Leid., O. Brux. and O. Bodl. II. They may belong to family members of our protagonist, but it is uncertain whether they were once part of a single archive.

The Theban ostraca in Leiden were acquired by J.H. Insinger in 1897-1901.<sup>6</sup> The Bodleian ostraca were purchased at the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century by A.H. Sayce.<sup>7</sup> The ostraca from O. Brux. were acquired from the collection of Jean Capart. Since Capart presented the Theban ostraca to Viereck in 1912, he must have acquired these in the early 1900s.<sup>8</sup>

The name Μεχφρῆς Ὠρου Μεχφ(ρήους) is attested in O. Bodl. II 1182, dating from 15 July 89. The variant Μεγπρῆς Ώρου appears in O. Bodl. 2 1191 (AD 103) and Μεκφρῆς Ὠρου is found in O. Bodl. 2 620 (6 August 105). As these texts are older than the time frame of the above archive, they may either refer to Mechphres III or to his grandfather Mechphres II.<sup>9</sup> Horos, son of Mechphres and grandson of Horos, attested in SB X 10418 (= O. Leid. 126) of 21 December 142, could either be the father of Mechphres III or his son. The Horos of O. Brux. 10 of 21 August 113, may be identified as the father of Mechphres III. 10 Other family members may be attested in O. Leid. 308, O. Bodl. 2 1866 and O. Bodl. 2 1891. A possible reconstruction of a part of the family is suggested by us in App. 1. 11

In some of these uncertain texts the same tax types are found as in the certain texts (see App. 2). The bath and dike-tax appear in *O. Bodl.* 2 620. The bath-tax also occurs in *O. Bodl.* 2 614, while in *O. Leid.* 126 the guard-tax is combined with the watchtower-tax. Other taxes do not appear in the archive texts, e.g. the tax for the upper toparchy (*O. Bodl.* 2 1182), paid to the temple granary (θησαυρὸς τῶν ἱερῶν); <sup>12</sup> *O. Brux.* 10 is a receipt for chaff.

Three *dekania*-lists are found among the uncertain ostraca (*O. Bodl.* 2 1866, *O. Bodl.* 2 1891 and *O. Leid.* 306). According to *O. Bodl.* 2 1191 Mechphres (II?) son of Horos was *dekanos* in AD 103, and according to *O. Bodl.* 2 1891 Horos (I, III or IV) son of Mechphres was also active as a *dekanos* (date unknown). The *dekania*-lists *O. Bodl.* 1866 and *O. Leid.* 306 do not indicate the *dekanos* (for *dekania*-lists, see ArchID 459).


