A study of the archive has not yet been made.

## Description

The ostrakon and one wooden tablet are kept in the Egyptian Museum of Cairo. The other tablet, SB X 10298 + *MIO* 13 (1967), p. 181-182 no. 2, turned up in Zürich.

This small archive consists of two wooden tablets and one ostrakon. These three receipts indicate that Nechouthes<sup>69</sup> and his brother Pakoibis leased land from the temple of Pathyris in 104-100 B.C. They also owned some land: on August 2, 89 B.C. Nechouthes sold ½ aroure of a plot to Peteharsemtheus, son of Panebchounis (P. Lond. III p. 20-21 no. 1209). According to P.W. Pestman<sup>70</sup> Pakoibis must have died in 103 B.C.: on 10 December Peteharsemtheus and Petesouchos, sons of Panebchounis, borrowed money from Peteharsemtheus, son of Nechouthes (P. Grenf. II 27). This loan, however, is a renewal of a loan previously made to them by Pakoibis, the son of the present lender. Therefore it seems likely that Pakoibis died in 103 B.C. and that his father renewed the outstanding loan to Peteharsemtheus and Petesouchos, sons of Panebchounis. P.W. Pestman links this Nechouthes, son of Peteharsemtheus, to Horos' family (identifying him with Horos' brother Peteharsemtheus) since P. Adler Gr. 12, 1. 6 (101 B.C.); Gr. 13, 1. 8 (100 B.C.); Gr. 14, 1. 11 (100 B.C.) and Gr. 16, 1. 7 (99 B.C.) mention a plot of high land which belonged to Pakoibis but came in the possession of the sons of Phibis, son of Panechates. This identification of Nechouthes' father Peteharsemtheus with Horos' brother, however, remains uncertain.
